Objectives	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>(i) On the eve of 19<sup>th</sup> August World Humanitarian day inform all humanitarian and development actors' especially non state actors on outcome of WHS (World Humanitarian Summit) / Grand Bargain process.</li> <li>(ii) In view of the Grand Bargain outcome to place expectations from local / national non state humanitarian and development actors that how there will be a sovereign, accountable and sustainable growth of a local civil society / non-government sectors in this regard. These will also commensurate "aid effectiveness and development effectiveness" discourse too.</li> <li>(iii) Also to listen major GoB (Government of Bangladesh) stakeholders, donor's and INGO's perspective on the issues in this regard.</li> </ul>

Background	<p>In the backdrop of shrinking aid flow UN have had initiated a worldwide consultation and discourse on WHS during 2013 to 2016. The summit has ended during May 2016 in Istanbul but carry forward the new narrative of policy and to promote the policy implementation the Grand Bargain process has initiated by around 51 Lead donor countries, UN (United Nations) agencies and INGOs (International Non-Government Organization).</p> <p>There was a final outcome report from the UN Secretary General on after the WHS, please see the report in the link, <a href="https://worldhumanitariansummit.org/sites/default/files/media/A-71-353%20-%20SG%20Report%20on%20the%20Outcome%20of%20the%20WHS.pdf">https://worldhumanitariansummit.org/sites/default/files/media/A-71-353%20-%20SG%20Report%20on%20the%20Outcome%20of%20the%20WHS.pdf</a>, please see the section C, where it has been given importance on supremacy of local and national organization. On the basis of this, all most all the INGOs have signed Charter4change (<a href="http://www.charter4change.org">www.charter4change.org</a>, ) with a commitment to respect greater and sovereign role of local and national organization and channeling more direct fund to them aiming to promote a sustainable and accountable NGOs growth. We are also using the term CSO (civil society organization) in respect of NGO in this regard.</p> <p>Along with this WHS there was a process of Grand Bargain launched during May 2016, to reduce the financing gap in humanitarian sector especially through management efficiency in improving delivery. The process have been participated by 15 donors (Australia, Belgium, Canada, Denmark, ECHO, Germany, Japan, Netherlands, Norway, Sweden, Switzerland, Turkey, UAE, UK and US) and 15 agencies ( FAO, ICRC, ICVA, IFRC, Interaction, IoM, OCHA, SCHR, UNDP, UNHCR, UNICEF, UNRWA, WFP, WHO and World Bank). The Grand Bargain process came with 51 commitments with 10 mainstream, which is are related to (i) Transparency, (ii) National and local responders (localization), (iii) Cash based programming, (iv) Reducing management cost, (v) Needs assessments, (vi) Participation revolution, (vii) Multi – year planning and financing, (viii) Reducing earmarks, (ix) Harmonized and simplified reporting requirements, (x) Strengthening engagement between humanitarian and development actors. The statement as widely distributed during WHS Geneva consultation as well in WHS Istanbul</p>

Key issues of the statement are in view of equitable and dignified partnership and thereby setting Indicators on principles of partnership and periodical review, prioritize 'accountability' in place of 'accounts ability', minimum 20% overhead management cost to the partner organization not only for central management, for institutional development also, INGO and UN agencies should limit their operation in national and local level only to facilitate the local NGOs/ CSO development, and partnership agreement must Include the clause for arbitration and joint evaluation.</p> <p>We all also know the aid effectiveness and development effectiveness discourse which have had happened from Paris Declaration (2005) to Nairobi Declaration (2016), which have accepted the role of civil society along with state and market for broader "Development Effectiveness" discourse. Civil societies has also declared Istanbul declaration (2010) on their role which has also came out through a global process (<a href="http://cso-effectiveness.org/-istanbul-principles,067-.html">http://cso-effectiveness.org/-istanbul-principles,067-.html</a>),. Major principles in this regard are respect and promote human right and social justice, embody gender equality and equity while promoting women and girls' right, focus on people's empowerment, democratic ownership and participation, promote environmental sustainability, practice transparency and accountability, pursue equitable partnership and solidarity, create and share knowledge and commit mutual learning, and commit to realizing positive sustainable change. In view of these many government has implemented aid effectiveness / development effectiveness section, as like as Government of Bangladesh, currently Bangladesh is the Co- Chair of GPEDC (Global Partnership for Effective Development Cooperation, <a href="http://www.effectivecooperation.org">www.effectivecooperation.org</a>) steering committee along with Germany and Uganda, being represented by Honorable Finance Minister Mr. Abdul Maal A Muhith. The committee will have their next meeting in Bangladesh during October 2017.</p> <p>Taking these changing perspective with emergence of new narrative in civil society / non-government organization 's partnership, and in taking the opportunity of the World Humanitarian Day, Bangladeshi local / national NGOs who have been actively participated in those process do like to place their expectations in public and discuss with all related stakeholders especially with donors, INGOs and UN agencies.</p>
