## Youth club's Activities

Host and Rohingya youths are one of the key PoC of social cohesion project implemented by COAST Foundation in collaboration with UNHCR. COAST provides technical and skill development training, construction of clubhouses, computers and sports equipment to 3 local clubs to encourage the youth of the two communities to participate in various social activities and create an environment. COAST is also working with club members to ensure social cohesion and peaceful coexistence through various activities including various national and international day observation, social awareness campaigns, sports competitions, coordination meetings. In September and October 2021, COAST organized anti-drug campaigns and discussions with three local youth clubs. Apart from the club members, local civil society, journalists, teachers, imams, police and many others participated in the program. At the event, the members of the club promised to work regularly to make the locals aware against drugs. Following this, Lambabil Kira Parishad organized a campaign and yard meeting to make the local people aware against drugs. About 100 locals of different ages participated in the program, which was held in the village of Lombabil in Whykong Union. Through this program, the members of the club try to make people aware of various harmful aspects of drugs and the decline of youth society, participation of all against drugs and various aspects of family, social and national problems.
